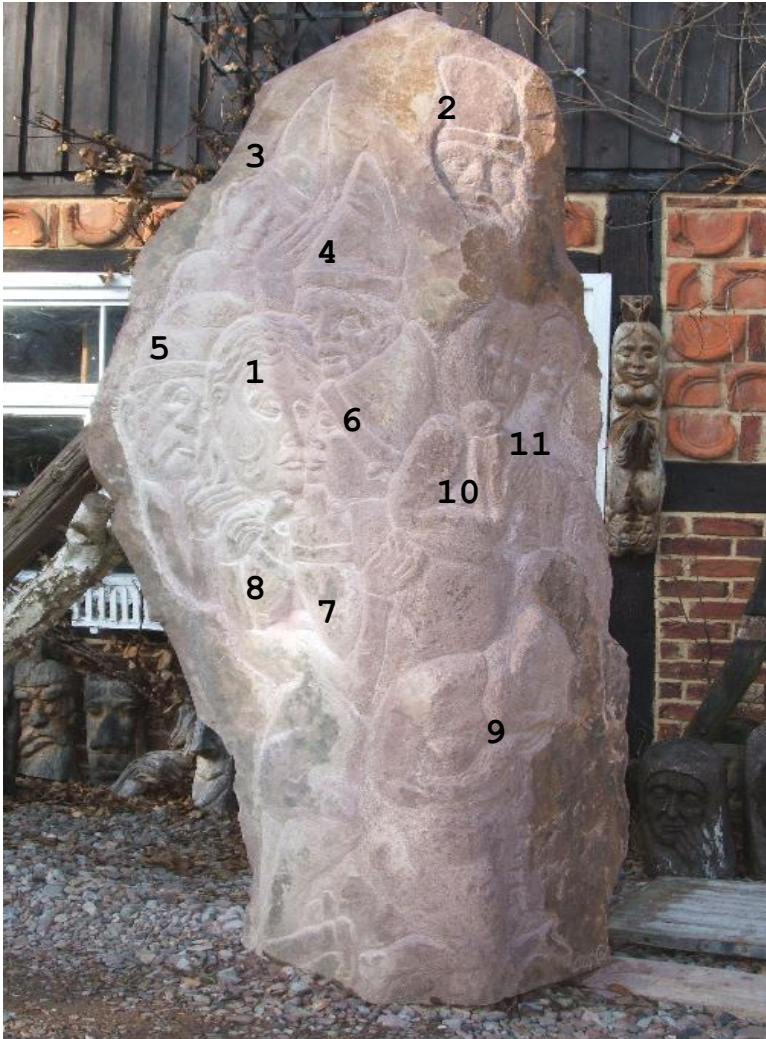


Schneewittchen and the seven dwarfs

Description of the figures and their characters in the interpretation of the artist



Each figure carries a name:

1. Schneewittchen: is pictured prettily and in good faith.

2. Dwarf Hans: an individualist, who sets off from the community of the dwarfs. Although industrious he goes his own ways.

3. Dwarf Peter: loves the peace, a woman can't move him.

4. Dwarf Paul: is a sensitive lad. Here he sniffs with pleasure at Schneewittchen's hair.

5. Dwarf Josef: is already somewhat older and clarified. He plays gladly with the woman's hair, which alone makes him fairly happy.

6. Dwarf Bernd: a dare-devil. **7. Dwarf Udo** and **8. Dwarf Fritz:** The sight of Schneewittchen delighted both. They are lucky that the life without a woman has an end. They love her dearly. **9. Kunigunde:** Schneewittchen's bad stepmother: She believes to be beautiful. She has a mirror purchased, which reports her, who the most beautiful woman in the country is. If a woman should be more beautiful than her, she is ready to kill her. Finally she kills Schneewittchen in revenge and jealousy. **10. Granny Maria** and **11. Granddaughter Anja:** They read gladly in fairy tale books. They have only the one desire that the fairy tales are never forgotten!
